


Irish Foster Care Association



 Frequent requests from membership at regional levels for training and information on Attachment.


 High turnout and positive feedback relating to all such learning provision – either IFCA or Tusla – led.

IFCA's Hopes for the future



- To develop an awareness of attachment and developmental issues relating to children and adolescents within the all relevant professions.
- To promote practice and research in these areas.
- To share experience, knowledge, resources and expertise and to develop a support network that
 is available to all those involved in the care of children.
- To promote inclusiveness of all relevant parties, not just mental health professionals with regards to the provision of training and learning regarding attachment and developmental trauma.
- Development of additional training provision to Foster Carers, Social Workers and Social Care workers – and the establishment of appropriate funding to make access to such learning possible.
- The compilation of robust database of trained professionals in this area and the sharing of such information with all relevant parties.
- To use our knowledge to inform the public, policy makers and legislators of the needs of children and adolescents who have encountered attachment issues or developmental trauma.
